The work of God was so real to Robinson that he had to sing about it. The Song that he asked for in the first verse is revealed in the second. He raises his Ebenezer (a stone of memorial) marking the place where God rescued him from the life of sin that ensnared him.

As vou may have figured out by now, I am speaking about my friend Nathan Lawson. He grew up at FBC as a child. Went through his teenage years in the FBC Youth group. Spent lots of time with Brother Bob Sutton before leaving for College.

Then, after College he and Wanda came back to FBC and to both their surprise Nathan became the Minister of Youth.

After 8 years of incredible service to the Lord through FBC Nathan and Wanda have experienced the Lord calling them away from the Youth Minister role. It truly saddens my heart to know at the start of the New Year I will no longer have my friend on staff with me. However, rather than leave on a sad note, I would instead like for Nathan to know how thankful I am for him.

When I first met Nathan, I was very intrigued by him. I knew he raised cattle and this was fascinating to me for two reasons. First, I grew up on a dairy farm and so the smells, sounds, and sights of a farm bring great joy to my heart. Second, I have an odd fear of cows. As a child, I was charged by momma cows enough times to where I wouldn't be found in the field if the cows were out!

Nathan, being the great friend that he is, helped me to conquer this fear without me even knowing it. I had told him of my irrational cow phobia and he empathized with me, told me stories about his cows and would light up anytime I asked him about his farm. One day, in hopes to

spend some time with my friend I went out to his farm to visit. He needed to check on the cattle, so we rode a short distance to the field and got out of the truck. We talked as we went through the gate and soon I found myself walking through a herd of 1500 pound black beasts! It was amazing! But that isn't all. A few minutes later we drove to another field. Nathan said he had to put out some mineral for the cows. I honestly had no idea what that meant but was happy to be out with him. We entered the field without a cow in sight. Before long he had emptied a huge bag of mineral into a feeder and was calling the cows.

Here they came, lumbering over the hill top. It seemed liked hundreds of the massive mammals were headed toward us. In reality, it was probably 50. They

crammed in on that feeder as if they hadn't been fed in months. All the while Nathan was talking with me as I trembled inside. The cows inched closer and closer to me. Their tails were swatting flies and hitting me in the process. Occasionally a

bovine would look at me with their big eye as if to peer into my soul. Yet, Nathan just smiled and kept talking to me. At one point the cows were so close that I thought about jumping into the truck bed and yet my friend talked me through the trauma.

At the end of the day, I wasn't near as afraid of cows. Why? Because my friend led me through what I needed to do to get past it.

I know Nathan has done the same for many if not most of you. Maybe it was something on the farm, but most likely it was bigger and more important than that. He led you to scripture, prayed with you and then kept up with the issue to make sure you were making it through.

Friends like Nathan don't come along very often. I will miss him being on staff with me as I know you will too.

Nathan, you are loved and will be greatly missed!

Janet Barnett—Make three more quilts for her family, have good personal health so I can continue to pray.


Jill Sharp—To live more Christ-like. Not get offended by things that people say and do. Learn to control my actions.






The members of Second Baptist invite everyone to a special service of recognition on Sunday, January 14th at 3:30 p.m. A reception will be held immediately following the service.


