THE CARILLON



Greetings Church Family and Friends!

These are also wonderful and exciting days at First Baptist Church. While it is at a slow pace, it is evident that God is moving in a powerful way as people are trusting Christ and the church is growing both in unity and membership. In that vein, I wanted to use my next few *Carillon* articles to highlight some of the activities and opportunities currently at First Baptist and invite you to participate in them if you are not already.

The first opportunity I wanted to highlight is our <u>Sunday Evening</u> <u>Service</u>. The reality is that because of the steady decline in attendance and participation on Sunday Evenings, many churches have seen it best to

let the Sunday Evening service slowly disappear. If I am honest, there is a part of me that understands and even knows that I would likely enjoy the occasion to relax and be home with my family before another busy work week begins. However, there is another part of me - a larger part - that desires more time for our church to gather for corporate prayer, fellowship, mutual encouragement, and less formal but more interactive Bible Study. The author of Hebrews writes:

"Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful.

And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet,
as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near."

Hebrews 10:23-25.

The Bible, here, instructs us that we, as believers ought to gather to encourage one another "all the more - not less - as we see the day approaching". Certainly, we are closer to 'the day' than we have ever been and it seems appropriate that we strive to keep this clear command from scripture. Furthermore, scripture refers to the Sabbath as "The Lord's Day". Let me be clear, scripture certainly does not mandate a second service on Sunday Evening, however surely the language of the *Lord's Day* at least means we should consider devoting to him more than just the morning Sunday School hour or worship time. Isn't he worthy of more? And what better place to begin with your family for the week ahead - with all its unknown twists and turns than time in prayer, Bible Study, and fellowship with the Lord's people?

With that said let me share with you both what our current Sunday evening service looks like as well as some upcoming changes. Over the last several months, Bro Carl and I have shifted the Sunday Evening worship time of prayer and teaching that lasts **one hour**. The prayer time is done in three stages:

- Prayers of Praises these offer thanks to God for the ways we have seen him work,
- Prayers of Petition these are physical needs, surgeries, sickness, etc.
- <u>Prayers of Intercession</u> these are needs that are of a Spiritual nature such as a lost family member or friend, a loved one's growth in Christ, our church, or our One, etc.

In addition, the evening service is also a time for us to do an abbreviated Bible Study that provides more interaction and dialogue than the usual Sunday Morning sermon. We have also recently begun to meet in the chapel as we feel that because of the numbers that attend, this provides more of an intimate setting for our fellowship with one another than the sanctuary currently does. Moreover, beginning in January, First Baptist will be launching community groups that meet off campus at various homes one Sunday evening a month. These groups will provide all of the benefits that we have mentioned above while at the same time providing a time of enhanced fellowship and encouragement for those in similar life stages throughout our church (similar ages, young families, retired, empty nesters, etc.) as well as an opportunity to engage unchurched and lost friends who may feel more comfortable meeting in a home initially.

Please, hear my heart on the matter, this in no way is intended to guilt you or make you feel bad. Rather, the purpose is to encourage you with what is happening at First Baptist, inform you of the opportunities present, and highlight the Sunday Evening service. Thank you for the joy of being your pastor!

As you may have heard, beginning with the first Sunday evening in January (January 5, 2020), First Baptist will be implementing an intentional time of fellowship known as "Community Groups" or "CGs" which will meet in the homes of church members. You may be new to First Baptist or you may have been here for years, regardless of whether you fall into the former or latter category, I want to invite you to consider participating in a CG. As your pastor, my job is not simply to minister but also to equip you to do the work of ministry (Ephesians 4). God intends for you to be intimately connected with others in the body of Christ. Community Groups provide that very opportunity, and I pray you will take advantage!

So, what is a community group and what does a

community group do? The foundation for community groups is rooted in our mission, vision, and values at First Baptist (Love, Grow, Commit, Go). All that we do as a church is intended to support this mission and vision. To that end, let me share with you what we hope to see from this intentional time of fellowship:

<u>Vision:</u> Community groups at First Baptist are small groups of people, connected by similar life stages (ages, retired, empty nesters, etc.) who gather together in homes or at the church to build intentional relationships, be transformed by the Gospel, and be sent to live life on mission. CGs are

designed both for those within our church and also as an avenue to invite those who are apart from Christ or unchurched. Generally speaking, CGs gather regularly in homes to enjoy fellowship (usually over a meal or dessert)

for prayer, Bible Study, and fellowship. While there are many

We do not want community merely for the sake of community. We want community centered on the Gospel. Community groups at First Baptist are intended to glorify God by making and growing disciples. We know true life transformation will only come through the power of the Word of God by the Holy Spirit. That means our CGs

must be focused on seeing men and women transformed by the Word to be more like Christ. We want to help everyone take the next step, in faith, toward Christ-likeness.

<u>GROWING DEEPER</u> IN RELATIONSHIP WITH OTHERS

GALATIANS 6:2

We all want to be known. We want to feel that someone knows us, loves us, and is for us. We were built for community, and the Gospel itself calls us to community. Community Groups at First Baptist provide an opportunity for you and your family to know others

deeper and to be known deeper. CGs are designed to foster a community in which you can live out the Christian life with others. Your CG is a place for people to feel known and loved: CGs are designed to foster deep and lasting relationships. More than making it through a list of discussion questions or sticking to an outlined agenda, we value building relationships. We want to be transparent about our struggles and our victories. We want to encourage and be encouraged, to exhort and be exhorted. These kinds of relationships are messy. They're messy

because we are messy. None of us have it all figured out;
therefore, we need each other. These deep relationships
are not built over night. They are built by weeping
together, rejoicing together, and living life together over

time. Our CGs prioritize relationships.

Overall, community groups are not designed to be an event you attend but a family to which you belong. This is the place where we encourage one another, bear each other's burdens, pray for one another, hold each other accountable, and remind each other of the Gospel. I hope you will consider participating as a family and take advantage of this fellowship opportunity.



Pineapple Cheese Ball

2 (8 oz.) pkgs. cream cheese

2 T. chopped onion

1/2 chopped green pepper

1 (8 oz.) can crushed pineapple - drained well

1/2 c. chopped pecans

Mix and form into ball. Roll the cheese ball in chopped pecans. Store in refrigerator until ready to serve.

Scalloped Tomatoes

28 oz. can tomatoes 3/4 c. white sugar

2 biscuits crumbled 2-3 T. butter

Combine tomatoes, sugar, crumbled biscuits and butter. Stir and pour into a casserole dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

1 t. salt

Mom Brookshire Dumplings

3/4 c. water

1 t. salt

1 egg

1 T. shortenina

2 c. plain flour

Combine ingredients to form dough. Add extra flour as needed. Roll out to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut dough into 1 inch wide strips by 2 inches long. Cook in boiling chicken or turkey broth for 10 minutes. Thicken broth if needed. Drop chunks of chicken or turkey into broth and serve hot.

Biscuits

2 c. flour 3 t. baking powder*

Sift together and then add:

4 level T. shortening 3/4 c. milk (approximate)

Cut in shortening with two knives until the mixture looks like corn meal. Add milk a little at a time. Knead and roll out on a floured board or wax paper. Bake in hot oven at 475 degrees.

*Note: If using self-rising flour - omit baking powder and salt.

Yellow Squash Casserole

8 - 10 small yellow squash, sliced salt & pepper to taste2 T. Sugar8 oz. cream cheese

1 sleeve Ritz crackers margarine

Wash and slice squash. Place in a pan with water and cook until almost tender. Drain the squash and put back in pan. Add cream cheese When cream cheese has melted, carefully drain any additional liquid from the pan before stirring. Add salt, pepper, and sugar. Pour in a greased baking dish. Crumble crackers over the top of the mixture. Top with pats of margarine on top of the crackers. Bake in 350 degree oven for 25 - 30 minutes.

Green Pepper Casserole

3 medium green peppers
2 small jars chopped pimentos
1/2 lb. cheddar cheese, grated
2 hard boiled eggs
1 can cream of celery soup

1/4 c. half & half or milk

1/4 lb. Ritz crackers

Grind or chop green peppers. Add chopped boiled eggs, cheese, pimentos, celery soup, and milk. Pour into 1 quart greased dish in the following layers: pepper mixture, crushed crackers, and pats of butter. Continue to layer until the top layer is crushed crackers and butter. Bake in 425 degree oven for 30-45 minutes.
